KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- As of August 3, relief agencies had constructed 7,242 transitional shelters (t-shelters), with an additional 1,073 t-shelters under construction. Of the total, USAID/OFDA shelter partners had completed 3,750 t-shelters, with 617 t-shelters under construction. Relief agencies currently have funding available to construct more than 114,700 t-shelters, according to the Shelter Cluster.
- Teams of engineers from the Government of Haiti (GoH) Ministry of Public Works, Transport, and Communication (MTPTC), the U.N. Office for Project Services (UNOPS), and the Pan-American Development Foundation (PADF), with assistance from Miyamoto International, continue to conduct habitability assessments in earthquake-affected areas with USAID/OFDA and World Bank funding. As of August 5, engineers had assessed 232,496 buildings out of an estimated total of 350,000 to 400,000 buildings that required habitability assessments.
- Current habitability assessment figures indicate that 50 percent of houses are “green”, or safe for habitation, with an additional 27 percent classified as “yellow”, indicating that houses could be made safe with repairs, and 22 percent deemed “red”, or unsafe for habitation and requiring major repairs or demolition.

CONTEXT

- On January 12 at 1653 hours local time, a magnitude 7.0 earthquake struck southern Haiti. According to the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS), the earthquake’s epicenter was located 10 miles southwest of the capital Port-au-Prince, West Department. The earthquake killed an estimated 230,000 people and affected approximately 3 million others, according to the GoH. On January 13, U.S. Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake.
- During the months following the earthquake, humanitarian efforts met the immediate needs of earthquake-affected populations, through the provision of safe drinking water, food, household items, shelter assistance, and health care. USAID continues to work closely with other USG agencies, the GoH, and the international humanitarian

community to coordinate ongoing efforts and to facilitate a smooth transition from emergency relief activities to recovery operations, while preparing to respond to the potential for further deterioration in humanitarian conditions during the rainy and hurricane seasons.

Preparedness

- According to the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, international organizations have prepositioned various quantities of emergency relief commodities in preparation for a potential hurricane. To date, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) has prepositioned sufficient food to meet the needs of 70 percent of the estimated affected population, while the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) has prepositioned sufficient sanitation kits and medical equipment to benefit 47 percent of the projected affected population, according to CCCM Cluster reports. The U.N. Children’s Fund (UNICEF) and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies continue to stockpile emergency relief commodities, as well.
- IOM continues to preposition emergency relief commodities funded by USAID/OFDA—including hygiene kits, water containers, blankets, and kitchen sets—in Port-au-Prince, Gonaïves, Jacmel, and Les Cayes.

Shelter and Settlements

- On August 4, USAID/OFDA staff attended a meeting with PADF, UNOPS, and the World Bank to discuss the progress and next steps for the ongoing habitability assessment. The program is currently entering the second phase, in which project teams repair yellow houses to allow residents to return. Habitability assessments will also continue during the second phase.
- Project partners are currently developing technical guidelines for house repair in conjunction with the GoH, Miyamoto International, and U.N. and relief agencies.
- Meeting participants noted that approximately 118,000 to 168,000 buildings in all earthquake-affected areas of Haiti continue to require habitability assessments. The GoH has noted the need for habitability assessments in heavily-affected Gressier, Léogâne, Petit Goâve, Grand Goâve, and Jacmel.
- On July 28, USAID/OFDA staff conducted a site visit to the Delmas 32 neighborhood to observe habitability assessment activities. USAID/OFDA noted that due to accelerated site-clearing and rubble removal in the neighborhood, partners intend to increase the rate of house repairs due to better access. PADF plans to repair more than 1,200 houses in Delmas 32. USAID/OFDA staff also observed that residents are using rubble as temporary repair material for damaged roads.
- On July 29, USAID/OFDA staff visited Corail Cesselesse resettlement site outside Port-au-Prince to assess conditions, monitor ongoing response activities, and meet with relief agency staff working at the site. USAID/OFDA observed that IOM and World Vision have begun constructing t-shelters to benefit site residents, including t-shelters funded by USAID/OFDA through World Vision. USAID/OFDA staff also observed flood mitigation activities being carried out with heavy equipment by UNOPS.

Health

- The GoH Ministry of Health (MoH) has recommended that all mobile health clinics work in collaboration with fixed healthcare facilities within their area to ensure the transition from humanitarian assistance to sustainable provision of care, regardless of whether the facility is public, private, or managed by non-governmental organizations, according to a July 29 U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Assistance (OCHA) report. The MoH created a mechanism that allows referred patients from mobile clinics, children under five, and pregnant women to access health services free of charge at 27 designated healthcare facilities across the country during the coming months.

Protection

- On August 3, USAID/OFDA staff attended the Protection Cluster meeting. Cluster staff reported on upcoming humanitarian protection training for camp management staff and relief agencies, starting with training-of-trainers courses in August and training sessions in September. The trainings will include practical advice and concrete tips for addressing a number of protection issues, including community relations, working with municipal authorities, and dealing with sensitive questions.
- Cluster members noted the potential for an increase in protection concerns in the months preceding the coming presidential election. In addition, the cluster coordinator noted the need for continued reporting from cluster members regarding specific activities and operational locations in order to identify response gaps and improve coordination.
- On August 5, the child protection sub-cluster planned to hold a workshop to address planning for the next six months. Cluster members identified unaccompanied children and children separated from families as an ongoing concern. USAID/OFDA implementing partners continue to engage in activities to reunite families.
